

Francis Henry Conrad of Cambria County, Johnstown, Pennsylvania

Introduction—Like Father, Like Son

The Conrad family of Johnstown, Pennsylvania, date back to Baltzer Conrad who was born about 1770 in Frederick, Maryland. The focus of this family sketch is on Baltzer's great-grandson, Francis Henry Conrad. Francis Henry Conrad had one son, Francis Henry Conrad, Jr. In addition to them sharing the same name, Francis Sr. and Francis Jr. shared other similarities. Francis Henry Conrad, Sr. and Francis Henry Conrad, Jr. were both born in and grew up in Johnstown, Pennsylvania. Both father and son served in the Army—senior served during WWI and junior served during the Korean War. The similarities did not stop there, both father and son worked in the insurance industry—senior in life insurance and junior as an insurance broker for large corporations. Even more coincidental, Francis Jr. died on Francis Sr.'s birthday on 4 October.

Francis' Childhood

Francis was born 4 years after the tragic 1889 Johnstown flood that killed more than 2,000 people.³ Two of Francis' uncles perished in this flood.⁴

The Flood

Urgent requests from two men near the dam were given to the telegraph office to pass the information to the telegraph office in Johnstown, but the requests were never sent. At around 3:10 p.m., the South Fork Dam burst and 20 million tons of Lake Conemaugh cascaded down the Little Conemaugh River. On its way downstream toward Johnstown, the force of the water picked up trees, houses, and animals. Just before hitting the main part of the city, the flood surge hit the Cambria Iron Works at the town of Woodvale, taking with it railroad cars and barbed wire. Boilers from the Iron Works exploded. The inhabitants of Johnstown were caught by surprise as the wall of water and debris bore down on the village traveling at 40 miles per hour and reaching a height of



60 feet in places. Many people were crushed by pieces of debris and others became caught in barbed wire from the wire factory upstream. 9

The map below shows the location of Johnstown in the valley.

This flood was the first major disaster for which the newly formed Red Cross provided medical assistance, shelter, and supplies to the people of Johnstown. The depressing task of identifying the bodies was part of the process; however, 700 of those who perished could not be identified. Five thousand homes were destroyed and many families lived in tents. It took Johnstown 5 years to rebuild.¹⁰

Johnstown was still rebuilding from this epic disaster during Francis' early and formative years. Families likely struggled during this time and many decided to move out of the area. ¹¹ Francis' family endured the trying times and became an integral part of Johnstown's history.

As a child in the early 1900s, Francis probably played a lot outside. Horse and buggies were still in use until 1908 when the Ford automobile became more affordable due to the creation of the assembly line. Francis likely rode his bike or took a streetcar to get to school.

Francis attended parochial school and then Johnstown High School.¹² After school and during vacations, he sold the *Johnstown Tribune*.¹³ Francis spent his family vacations in Atlantic City, New Jersey, and at Luna Park (near Coney Island), New York.¹⁴

Francis as a Young Adult

When Francis was 16 or 17, he met Viola Grace Custer at her 16th birthday party. ¹⁵ They kept in touch over the years, finally marrying in 1925 when they were in their early 30s. ^{16,17}

When Francis was 17, he lived at 524 Vickroy Street in Johnstown, Pennsylvania, with his parents and siblings. ¹⁸ Prior to that, the family lived at 147 Singer Street in Johnstown City. ¹⁹

After high school, in 1912, Francis enrolled in and completed a business course. Then he went to work for the Lorain Steel Company eventually working in the purchasing department. ²⁰

Francis Enlists in WWI

On June 5, 1917, Francis was drafted but failed to pass the Army physical.²¹ However, on 2 April 1918, he enlisted in the U.S. Army and was sent to Camp Lee, Virginia, assigned to the personnel section of the 317 Infantry.²² Francis described himself as 5'5 1/4" tall with brown eyes, black hair, and a slender build.²³

Francis went to France in May 1918 on the transport Mongolia, and landed at Brest, France. He participated in the Argonne, Saint Mihiel, and Somme-Aisne offensives. ^{24,25}

Francis kept a daily itinerary of his travels during WWI and received letters from family members regularly and responded often. ^{26,27}

On 9 December 1918, Francis wrote home from LeMans, France:

Dearest Folks:

At present I am waiting patiently on trucks to take us some thirty miles from our present place so will write describing some of my experiences. Some weeks ago another chap and myself started out to locate our outfit to secure some information, we knew they were some twenty miles away and had an idea of their location. We had an old automobile road map to goby, anyway we started out to find them, left the place our office was located at 7:00 a.m. with full equipment, we hiked until noon when we reached advanced area, in other words, villages and woods recently evacuated by the Germans, so the traveling got harder as the place was full of shell holes and mine entanglements galore as well as the road being shot up in many places but we pushed on passing all kinds of artillery. One surely does get their ears ringing around an artillery outfit, we passed hundreds of guns all sizes, late in the afternoon we located the place where the regiment had been the day before or the place we had been instructed to find them, as they had to continue on. We hiked some three or four miles when we finally located them.

During this last three or four miles we saw a fine sight, a German plane was maneuvering near one of our observation ballons. The air-craft guns were popping away at him and kept him away for some time but finally he succeeded in getting thru and made a straight nose dive for ballon, passed right over top of same, immediately the ballon observer jumped out with his parachute, made a safe landing. I was only 100 yards away from him, after the plane had crossed over the ballon it went up in flames, I think they pour some kind of liquid fire or chemicals on ballon. The plane meaning (German) started back towards his lines, he was flying very low, machine-guns and anti air-craft guns had the sky covered with shrapnel and bullets but he continued to fly, up and down in fact, every direction, finally an American



plane was seen giving chase, the guns stopped firing in order to give him a chance, it only took him some twenty minutes to get the German and Gee! We were glad he got this fellow as he seemed to be a nervy and daring aviator we were all afraid he would get away but it was a relief to see him come down. . . 28

On January 4, 1919, 6 months before his honorable discharge, he wrote home:

Talk about excitement that other night about three a.m. I was awakened and when I looked, I saw about four fellas standing on their bed sacks with shoes in their hands, they were chasing rats and big ones at that, we killed two before we again went to sleep, there is about twelve of us who sleep in a fair sized room in one of the old French barns, those rats sure did get a run for their money. . .one of the fellas had one sitting on his face about a week ago. . .they hardly bother me anymore. What a life, eh?²⁹

Francis Returns from War

He was discharged at Camp Lee, Virginia, 13 June 1919, returned to Johnstown, and rejoined the Lorain Steel Company. ^{30,31} The following February, he enrolled at Carnegie Institute of Technology and went on to earn his bachelor's degree in 1921. ³² He then started working for the Edward A. Woods Company in Pittsburgh as a general agent for the Equitable Life Insurance Company of New York. He was later transferred to Johnstown as a special agent for the company. ³³

Now that Francis felt established back home in Johnstown, he finally proposed to Viola. On 16 June 1925, Francis married Viola Grace Custer at the Church of the Sacred Heart in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and the reception was at the Hotel Schenley in Pittsburgh.³⁴

The bride was attired in a dark blue georgette crepe dress trimmed with gold braid with a hat to match. Her flowers were butterfly roses and lilies of the valley. ..³⁵

Francis was 31 years old and Viola was approximately the same age.³⁶ Three years later, Francis and Viola welcomed their only child, **Francis²** Henry Conrad, Jr. (Sonny) on 21 August 1928.³⁷ The 1930 census shows the Conrad family renting a home on Ferndale Avenue in Johnstown.³⁸ By the 1940s, the Conrad family owned the home at 1345 Kemmer Street in Johnstown, Pennsylvania.³⁹ Francis and Viola remained in this home for the rest of their lives.⁴⁰

One year after Francis, Jr. was born, the country went into The Great Depression. Between 1929 and 1939, millions of people lost jobs, banks closed, and many families lost everything. The Conrad family seemed to fare pretty well during this time. Francis was employed and they had a home in Westmont. They even had a live-in maid who made \$5 per week and was responsible for cleaning, fixing meals, mowing the lawn, and more! 41,42

On 30 October 1938, there was a nationwide panic when Orson Welles broadcasted *The War of the Worlds* announcing that Martians were invading Earth. Most listeners did not know it was fiction. Francis and his son, Francis Jr., were at Francis' office in downtown Johnstown when the broadcast started. People were running out into the street to look up into the sky to see if they could see any Martians coming. Viola was at home alone and one could only imagine what she was thinking.⁴³

The 1940s and WWII helped to bring the country out of the Depression. Jobs were created and many people were able to go back to work in support of the war effort. Families planted victory gardens, used ration stamps, and were very conservative in their spending.⁴⁴

The 1950s ushered in the Korean War and Francis Jr. was drafted. Luckily, his parents insisted that he take the test for Officer Candidate School (OCS). After he was finished with basic training, he was one of two soldiers in his unit to be selected to go to OCS. After OCS, Francis Jr. was a second lieutenant in the Army and was transferred to Fort Worth and then to Washington, DC. Francis Sr. lived out his life in Johnstown, while Francis Jr. was stationed in Washington, D.C., met his wife-to-be, and ended up settling down in Northern Virginia and raising a family. 46

Francis and Viola enjoyed many years together. Francis continued to work well into his 70s for the Equitable Life Insurance Company and Viola enjoyed gardening and playing golf.⁴⁷ She had a beautiful garden in her backyard.⁴⁸

Viola (my mom) in Garden: This picture was taken in the backyard of our home at 1345 Kemmer Street, Johnstown, PA. Mom loved her flowers and roses. Notice the trellis is covered with beautiful roses. There were a few steps down thru the trellis to a small grassy plot, surrounded by flowers. Not in the picture, but to the right was our Victory garden where we raised our vegetables during WWII. Wren house on top of clothes pole always had occupants. Mom was a very active member of the Garden Club in Westmont and Johnstown and won many prizes for floral arrangements.

Francis' hobbies include motor traveling and golf, and he was a member of the Elks, American Legion, Sunnehanna Country Club, and North Folk Country Club. He was also the President of the Johnstown Life Underwriters Association, Director of the Edward A. Woods Company of Pittsburgh, and Vice President of the E.A. Woods Agents Association. 49

Every winter, Francis and Viola, along with friends, would fly south to enjoy the Florida warmth. It was there while on vacation that he died on 13 March 1977. Francis had been diagnosed with stomach cancer more than 10 years prior to his death. His family made the decision not to tell Francis about the cancer diagnosis. Francis' body was transported back to Johnstown and his funeral service was held on 16 March 1977 at Our Mother of Sorrows Catholic Church in Johnstown, Pennsylvania. Many family and friends attended the funeral. Viola died almost 6 months to the day of Francis' death.

Summary

Francis enjoyed growing up in a large family with seven brothers and sisters. They worked hard together to recover from the 1889 Johnstown Flood, as well as from The Great Depression. As Francis grew up, he enrolled in business courses

ready to become an established businessman and to marry his sweetheart. He settled down in Johnstown near his family roots and raised his only son who followed in his father's footsteps.

Genealogical Summary

First Generation

1. Francis¹ Henry Conrad (FrancisA) was born 4 October 1893 in Cambria County, Johnstown, Pennsylvania, to Frank J. Conrad and Anna Marie Burkhard. He married Viola Grace Custer on 16 June 1925 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Viola was born 2 December 1894 in Johnstown, Pennsylvania to Ida May Briney and Charles Freeman Custer, and died 12 September 1977. Francis¹ died on 13 March 1977 while on vacation with Viola in Tampa, Florida. Both Francis and Viola are buried in Grandview Cemetery in Johnstown, Pennsylvania. S8,59
